## History of the SCFVA, School Children's Flower & Vegetable Association

In the early 1920's, Park Superintendent, Adolf Jaenicke began organizing a program with the Fort Wayne Chamber of Commerce that would provide potted plants to school children. According to minutes from October 5, 1923, Board of Park Commissioners instructed Mr. Jaenicke that "plants be propagated in our greenhouse and later be distributed among school children throughout the city." The program officially began in 1926, and later, the first distribution took place in 1927 when a plant display by participating students was held at the courthouse. In 1928, flower seeds became available for purchase, and later in 1929, vegetable seeds were included as well. Mrs. John Memmewisch served as the first president of what eventually came to be known as the SCFVA, School Children's Flower & Vegetable Association. Under her leadership, the constitution was written to include all children in public and parochial schools.

Locations for an annual display changed over time as the number of plant entries grew. Following the first display, the location was moved to Central High School until 1954. It then moved to the Memorial Coliseum when challenges arose with each school wanting its own exhibit. In 1958, the association was disbanded with the "sincere hope that a new organization might be formed that would sponsor the continuation of the program." A re-organized SCFVA was formed after the Park Board maintained the program through 1961 when a new constitution was adopted, elections were held, and a new era of the plant show had begun! First made possible via volunteer efforts, plants and seeds were distributed to elementary school children in the spring. Come fall, each school held its own local plant show when all blue-ribbon winners became eligible to participate in a City-Wide Blue-Ribbon Show. This annual recognition show has been held at Franke Park, Blackhawk Middle School, and at the McMillen Community Center as its most recent location.

The program purpose as stated in the by-laws is to "further education in the Nature Study Theory by growing plants and molding characteristics of worth in making citizens of the future." Current-day, it is managed by the Foellinger-Freimann Botanical Conservatory and Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation Department. More than 19,000 potted plants are grown and distributed each spring. An abundance of seeds is also distributed and sown by participating children. On average, there are more than 60 schools, including homeschool groups, who participate in the SCFVA program. Together, let us continue to enhance an interest in nature that is inherent in children!

## SCFVA SCHOOL SHOW: School Chairperson's Checklist

#### **Before School Begins**

- Double-check your school show date with the principal &/or PTA president. Contact Botanical Conservatory staff with questions.
- Put a notice about the school plant show in registration packets, etc. for students Grades 1-5.

#### A Week Before the School Show

- Establish the location & table setup for displaying entries.
- As necessary, confirm show date, time & location with judges.
- Count ribbons to make sure there are enough; refer to prior Statistics Forms (pages 13-14).
- □ Announce the show & send home info/entry stubs (pages 9-11).
- □ Promote the show via posters, etc.
- Schedule helpers for the morning of the show. You may even allow students to bring entries after school the day before.
- Consider what might make the show even more fun! Create extra categories for the "goofiest" vegetable" or "smallest" plant, which could receive Green Thumb ribbons & special prizes. Get other students & teachers involved even if they did not grow anything or

their plant died; they could enter the existing "My Favorite Plant" category.

- Recall that each school receives a "Principal Plant" for them to participate as well.

#### Day Before the Show

- Have copies of the information page & entry stubs available in the school office (pages 9-11)
- Prepare ½ cut copies of "Helpful Hints from the Judges" (page 15) for ribbons awarded 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>.
- Gather supplies such as extra copies, a stapler & tape for securing entry stubs; scissors for trimming; fabric tape measure for size categories. A watering may also be useful.
- In case a student needs help displaying their entry, have misc. containers like paper plates, cups, or cans available.

#### Day of the Show

 As needed, offer copies of the entry stubs. Stay alert to all entries coming in, as it is the responsibility of the chairperson & helpers to make sure all entries are correct. If a student has incorrectly entered a category, advise on entering correctly.

- Before judges arrive, be sure that each entry (refer to page 9) is properly tagged with an entry stub & the student's name is concealed.
- Recall that while students may enter more than 1 category, only 1 entry is permitted per category.
- Recall that only students Grades 1– 5 are eligible to be judged & are qualified to take 1<sup>st</sup> place entries to the City-Wide Blue-Ribbon Show.
- Be sure all Blue-Ribbon winners receive a copy of the Winner's Congratulations/Invite (page 12).
- Track entries/ribbons on the Statistics Form (pages 13-14).
- Congratulate the students/staff as well as yourself & your helpers!
   Way to grow on contributing to a valuable program that brings us together in the common goal of growing something special!

NOTE: Please do not hover around entries or comment on entries when the judges are present.

## **Important Dates 2025**

#### Thursday, January 16: 1st School Chairperson's Meeting

Pick 1 of 2 meetings at the Botanical Conservatory to ask questions & receive an updated booklet. Before or soon after, distribute student order form (page 5) to Grades K–4.

#### Monday, February 3: Order Deadline

Submit order for total # of plants, ribbons, pencils, seeds & tshirts (page 6) to Conservatory Staff. Send ONE check to address at bottom of page; keep a copy for your records. Be sure to include your requested show date, as it is on a firstcome, first-serve basis. Note that School Shows must be completed prior to the City-Wide Blue-Ribbon Show.

#### Tuesday, April 1: Ordered Items Ready

Ordered items available for pickup during OPEN PUBLIC HOURS at the Botanical Conservatory; Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday & Saturday 10 am-5 pm; Thursday 10 am-8 pm; Sunday 12-4 pm. Orders will be held only until April 27 once plants have been distributed.

#### April 21-25: Plant Distribution to Schools

Plants distributed on designated dates (page 16). Provide students ¼ sheet (pages 7-8) along with ordered items.

#### Thursday, August 7: 2<sup>nd</sup> School Chairperson's Meeting

Pick 1 of 2 meetings at the Botanical Conservatory to see examples of the plants & learn more about judging criteria. Also ask questions & discuss how to make it more fun.

#### Late August/Early September: School Plant Shows

Remind students of your school's upcoming show! Send home pages 9-10 with Grades 1-5. Copy page 11 to have entry stubs available the day of & page 9 for reference.

#### Friday, September 12 & Saturday, September 13

**City-Wide Blue-Ribbon Show Registration** at the McMillen Community Center. Volunteers needed to help with entries. Refer to page 12 for more information.

#### Saturday, September 13: Day of the Blue-Ribbon Show

#### HOW EACH ENTRY IS JUDGED

#### Vegetables

- Should be clean & free of blemishes
- Tops of carrots & beets should be cut back to 1 inch
- Corn husks on ornamental corn should be pulled back & tied
- Giant sunflower seeds are judged in the vegetable category for maturity, symmetry & pattern; any yellow florets in the center of the flower head should be removed for seeds to be judged
- Entries for size are judged on size only
- When entering "3 Alike," the vegetables should be similar in size & color

#### Cut Flowers

- Judged for freshness, richness of color, symmetry & health of foliage/petals
- Should be free of blemishesWhen entering "3 Alike,"
- the flowers should be similar in size & color

#### Cut & Potted Herbs

- Judged for well-developed & abundant foliage as well as freshness & color
- Should be free of blemishes
- Should be properly groomed with discolored, dead, or damaged flowers & leaves removed

#### HOW RIBBONS ARE AWARDED

#### Potted Plants

- Should be properly groomed with discolored, dead, or damaged flowers & leaves removed
- Blooming Plants: Jacobinia, Begonia & Geraniums are judged first for health of the plant & overall growth; they are judged second for their flowers
- Foliage Plants: Asparagus Fern, Spider Plant, Umbrella Plant, Strawberry Begonia & Coleus are judged for well-developed & abundant foliage
- Coleus flowers as well as the "babies" of Strawberry Begonia & Spider Plants may remain as indicators of a healthy plant
- A 1<sup>st</sup> Place Blue Ribbon is awarded in every category for which there is an entry. Only one 1<sup>st</sup> Place Blue Ribbon is awarded in each category. Mutiple 2<sup>nd</sup> Place Red Ribbons, 3<sup>rd</sup> Place Yellow Ribbons, and 4<sup>th</sup> Place Orange Ribbons may be awarded. All student entries receive a ribbon.
- Individual plant tags that came with your plant are not necessary to participate in the show, as a missing tag
  does not disqualify the plant from receiving a ribbon. However, students are encouraged to include the original
  tag to be sure their plant is placed in the correct category by distribution year. Know too that plant tags may be
  used for judging if there are two completely equal plants in competition for the 1<sup>st</sup> Place Blue Ribbon.
- Only an entry is judged and awarded per its category; not by the plant container or included décor.

#### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

1. How many categories am I able to enter?

You may enter as many categories as you like, however, only one entry per category (does not apply to potted 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, or 4<sup>th</sup>). You may also enter any or all seed categories depending on what you grew.

2. What if my plant died or did not do so well?

Even if you did not get the results you wished for, enter your plant anyway! Another option is to enter the "My Favorite Plant" category; this would be an alternative, different plant you have grown that is not listed as an individual category.

3. May I enter a plant that I received in another year when attending a different Fort Wayne School? Yes, you are welcome to enter your plant(s) at the school you are attending now; even 4 + years!
